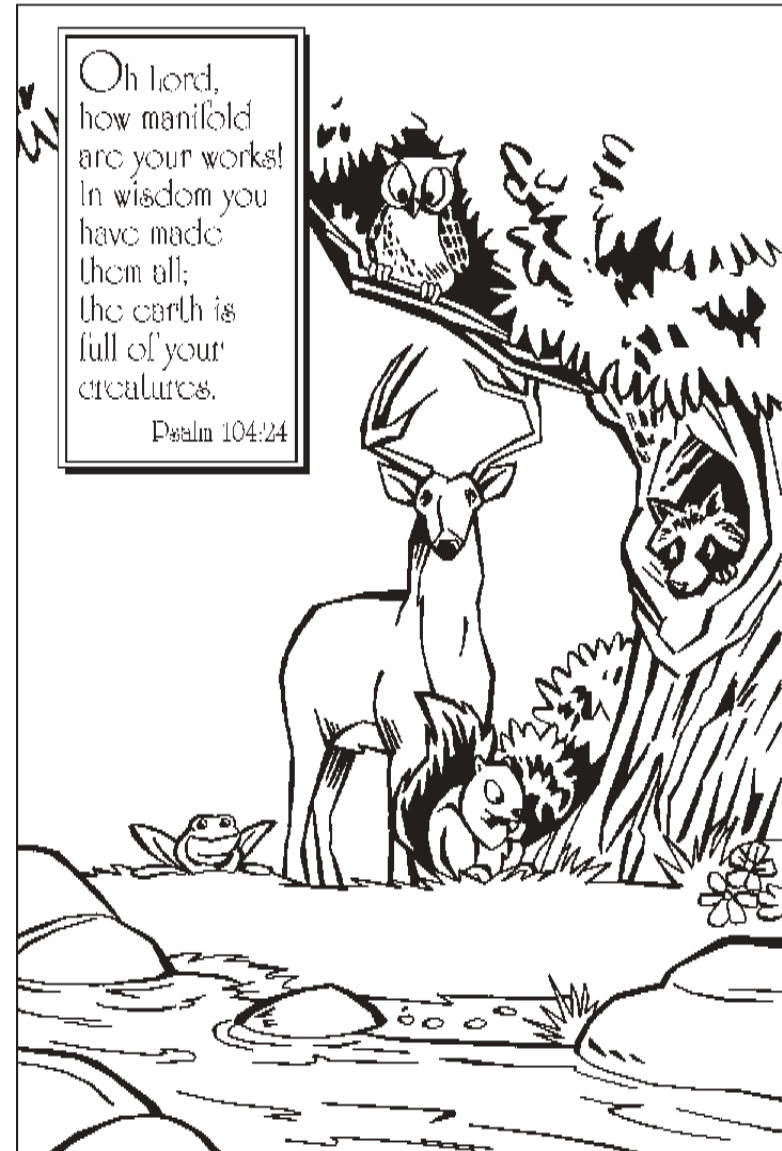

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,  
Wow! Hard to believe that Easter has come and gone and it is soon Pentecost. The Festival of Pentecost (08. June, this year) many times is overshadowed by graduations and weddings, end of school celebrations and early vacations. But the Festival of

Pentecost (the Coming of the Holy Spirit) is really one of the major days in the church year. Think in the line of Christmas, Good Friday, Easter and Ascension. Pentecost, the birth of the Church, the promised day when the Advocate, the Paraclete, the Comforter, the Spirit of the Living God comes to earth in fulfillment of Jesus' promise (*for the full story read St. John 16 and Acts of the Apostles 1 and 2, among others*).

We seldom speak of the Holy Spirit, we talk a lot of God the Creator and Jesus the Redeemer, but the Spirit is less than tangible for many of us. The Old Testament speaks of the Spirit of God as ruach a mighty wind or breath. The New Testament call it **pneuma**-breath/air. The Spirit, regardless, is active, not passive; moving, not idle. The Spirit brings vision and clarity, purpose and drive to the downhearted, the lost, the directionless.

What is our vision? Where is St. Paul's going? What is our mission? Is the Holy Spirit blowing in our community of faith? These are questions that can only be answered through prayer and discussion among all God's people here at St. Paul's.

Some may not want to address these 'new' ideas of visioning and mission. Some may be quite passionate about looking ahead. Some may only participate if 'those' people are no longer involved. All of these are excuses that block the Spirit's entry into our community.

Think of where you see St. Paul's in the next year, 3 years, 5 years. Think of what you see the Church of Jesus Christ, that is St. Paul's,

doing in the next 1 year, 3 years, 5 years. Be ready, the Holy Spirit is blowing through this community. We will be comforted and we will be made stronger with a vision, a mission and a God who love us.

*“I will bless you... so that you will be a blessing.” (Genesis 12.2).*

God’s call to Abraham is the pattern for God’s call to us. God promises to bless us that we might be a blessing through our stewardship of God’s bounty. Stewardship is the grateful offering of all that we have and all that we are to God’s service, because we trust that it all is the gift of a loving and generous God. Gifts given to the church can be both a sign of the grateful offering and an opportunity to grow in our trust of God. While the world around us teaches us to fear scarcity, God calls us to trust in God’s abundance. Heeding that call, the following principles will guide out Synod as we invite congregations and individuals to support the mission of the church:

1. Our focus will be on the need of the giver to grow in faith through giving rather than the need of the church to receive our gifts.
2. Our giving helps us recognize that we are the stewards not the owners of everything that God has entrusted to us.
3. Our giving should be proportionate, thankfully offering our first fruits.
4. Our giving should be significant, so we experience that God provides all we truly need.

5. Our giving should be joyful, a grateful response to our generous God.
6. Invitations to give to the church should never lose sight of the larger call to exercise stewardship in daily life. Proclaiming this call is the primary stewardship responsibility of the church. Blessed in worship by Word and Sacrament, God sends us forth to be a blessing in everyday life.

**'Hymns, Hymns, Everywhere ... Part I'** In the midst of the production and eventual publication of a new Lutheran worship hymnal, editorial teams are presently sifting through an estimated 10,000 hymns. A wealth of new hymns have been written just in the past few years. One need only look through *'With One Voice'* to see a glimpse of what is to come. *'New Hymns and Songs,'* a new Lutheran hymnal, will be published this summer. Those of us involved in worship planning are faced with challenges similar to those of the New Hymnody editorial teams - to sift through the myriad of published songs and collections, searching for hymns to include in worship from week to week. At present, the Renewing Worship project has begun competitions for original compositions to be used as new musical settings for the Lutheran liturgies. Melodies are being sought for specific parts of the Communion liturgy that are flexible and durable enough to cross a variety of cultural and musical styles. Yes, a new hymnal is on its way! The publication of the initial set of resources is being planned for the Fall of 2006. One need only look at the copyright date in the front of the Lutheran Book of Worship to see this hymnal has been around for a quarter of a century. How much have all of us changed in the past twenty-five years? How much has the world changed in this same span of time? Although the message of Christ's love and salvation through Him remains constant, the musical forms of expressing this message are constantly changing.

Let's look at some basics of Lutheran hymnody - what is a hymn, why do we sing hymns, and why did we sing *that* hymn? A hymn is a prayer set to music. It may be used to glorify God as in the case of the gathering or processional hymn, it most often is used to

emphasize the Gospel message of Christ as in the Hymn of the Day, and it can be used to sum up the entire theme of the particular day in sending God's people on their way into the world as in our Sending Hymn. We sing hymns in praise of our Creator and His Son, Jesus Christ. From the Old Testament comes the phrase, "... let my prayers rise up as incense." One can think of the singing of a hymn in much the same way. Most of the time, we sing familiar hymns throughout the Sunday worship service but occasionally we encounter the unfamiliar one. The words aren't the culprit, it's the tune! This hymn hasn't been chosen to throw a curve or 'gotcha.' It just may be the perfect one to use in carrying the theme for the day. It may be the only time it is ever used throughout the entire year. Remember, our lesson cycles change from year to year. I can remember a few years ago working in a particular Lutheran parish where whenever a new hymn was used, one could hear the cracking and slamming shut of the hymnal and the eventual banging of it into the hymnal rack on the back of the pew. It didn't seem to matter to these few people whether the rest of the congregation knew the hymn. They weren't going to sing it!

Although my back was to the congregation, I could name the culprits in my head. Did these people really know why they were in a church? One can only imagine how disturbing this was to fellow worshippers. I have often wondered what God must have thought since the entire service is in reverence to Him. Thankfully, that aura of disrespect does not occur here at St. Paul's.

I would like to continue teaching you, the congregation, some new hymns prior to the Prelude on Sunday mornings. I need your help in planning this, however. When we encounter a new hymn, and we've had some recently, jot down the hymn number or name of the hymn and place it in my mail box downstairs. There's plenty of room in my box so fill it up!!! Summer is the perfect time to teach the congregation these new hymns.

And whose smiles can make us cry.

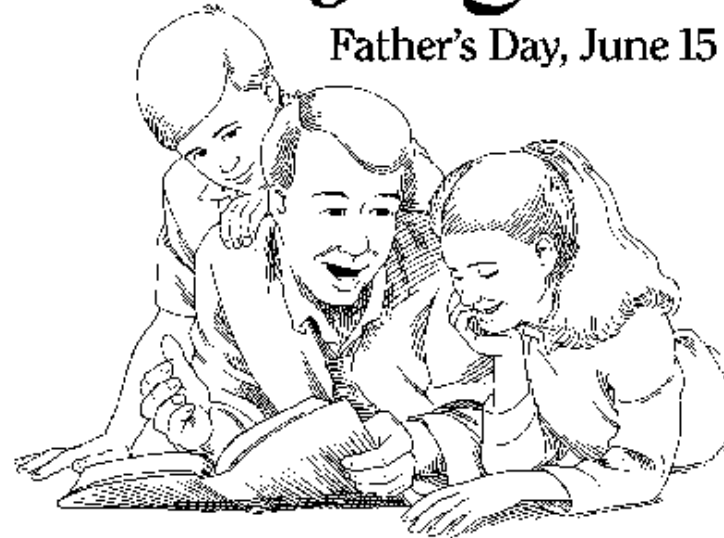
And we pray for those

## *Two-handed Days*

They sit with head in hand. This one in a wheelchair in the hall. Another in her room. That one on the sofa in the day room, paying no attention to the blaring TV. Each holding head in hand, heads heavy with waiting and memory. It takes at least one hand to hold them. Sometimes two.

They each held head high once. Observing many things. Scheming and planning. Dreaming and hoping. Now one hand must hold it. Sometimes two.

Heavy is the waiting - for supper, for medication, for the foot doctor, for a visit and a familiar voice, for bed and sleep, for death. It takes at least one hand for such waiting. Sometimes two.

Heavy is the memory - of love buried, of hope disappointed and abandoned, of wars won on distant shores, of homecomings and holidays, of passion and release. It takes at least one hand for such memories. Sometimes two is not enough.

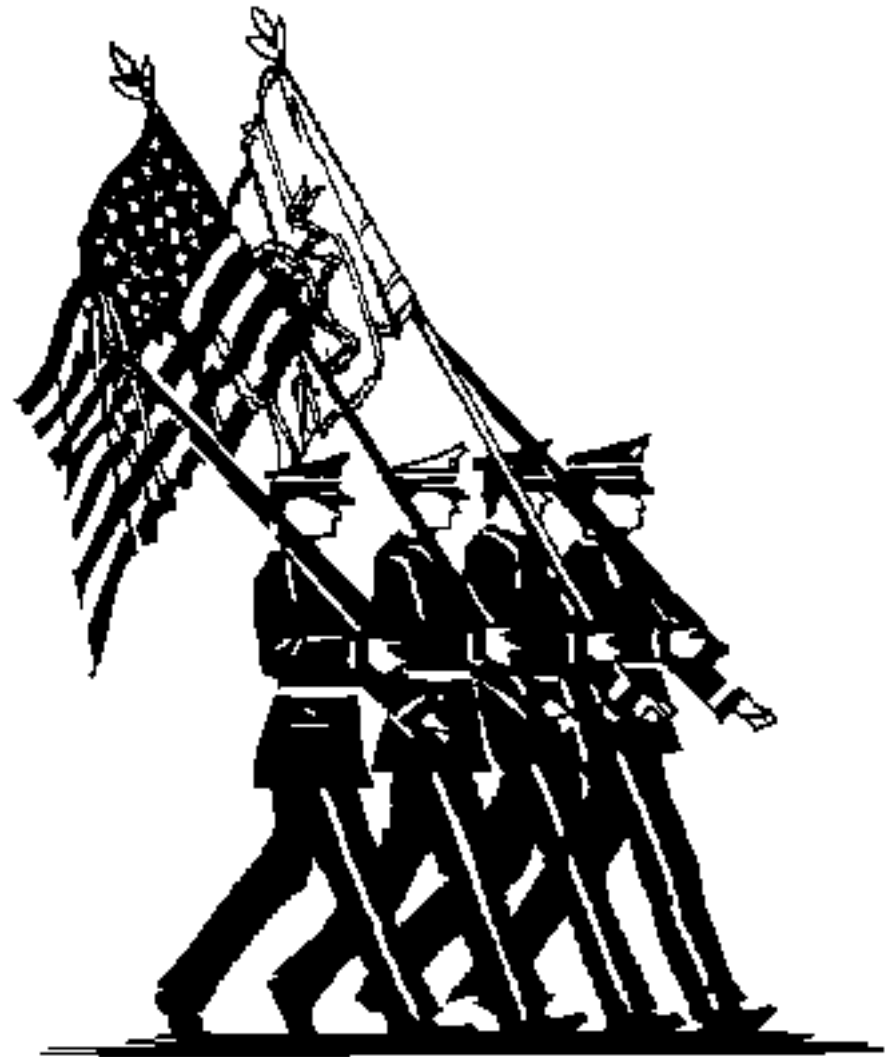
Nursing homes are what we once called these places of one-and-two handed heaviness. Now they are extended-care facilities. For too many they are extended-loneliness facilities. Often two hands are not nearly enough.

Neither are they enough for the grief and guilt of those who decide that this is where Grandma must go. "I'm sorry, Daddy," they want to say. But Grandma or Daddy would not comprehend the apology, so the brave ones say "I love you" instead. "I'll be back soon." The memories are heavy for the one who walks alone to her car. She will need two hands herself just to wipe the tears before the drive back to work.

I have complained to the Almighty about this. But God seems to have no better answer than mine when I say, "I'll be back soon. I love you." Some days it is definitely two hands.

*Remember in prayer the members of our congregation who are homebound or in nursing homes. There are all too many who need two-handed days.*

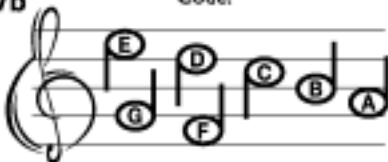

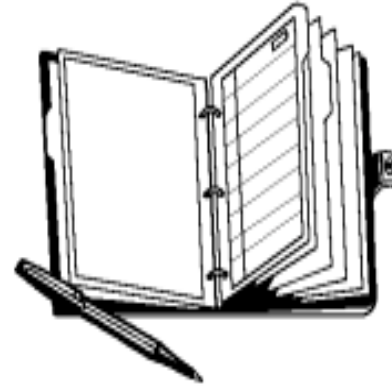
